STATE OF THE COUNTY



Vice Mayor Gregg Weiss was the keynote speaker at the Chamber of Commerce of the Palm Beaches' monthly breakfast on Jan. 6, where he delivered the State of the County address. He spoke to a room full of local business leaders about how the county is doing.

Despite the ongoing challenges from COVID-19, Vice Mayor Weiss said the county is in a strong position, with a 6 billion dollar budget and a triple-A bond rating.

He said that although Omicron is surging, with the knowledge we have gained, the development of vaccines, boosters and

therapeutics, we are in a fundamentally better place now than we were at the start of the pandemic.

He asked for a moment of silence for the people we've lost.

Then, he highlighted some of the county's accomplishments, focusing on the six strategic priorities:

1. Economic Development: Real estate values are booming, unemployment is near all-time lows, with jobs exceeding the number of job seekers.

2. Housing & Homelessness: Through the county's workforce and affordable housing programs thousands of units have been built and rehabbed in the past decade. The county is also continuing its efforts in dealing with homelessness, adding another homeless resource center in central Palm Beach County.

3. Environmental Protection: The Department of Environmental Resources Management has been doing a terrific job in the Lake Worth Lagoon, building islands that improve water quality while creating a habitat for birds and sea life.

4. Infrastructure: The county continues to invest in maintaining and expanding its road network with an increasing emphasis on safe walking and biking.

5. Public Safety: He praised our first responders and Community Services staff who have done a great job in dealing with the impacts of the pandemic that affected so many of our residents.

6. Substance Abuse & Behavior Disorders: The county continues to use innovative methods to address behavioral and substance abuse disorders, like the one-of-a-kind addiction stabilization unit the county created, together with the Health Care District of Palm Beach County and JFK Medical Center.

Vice Mayor Weiss stressed the gains that the county has made in advancing these priorities, though he said more work is needed, especially when it comes to affordable housing and water resources.

He expressed gratitude to his fellow commissioners and stated that although they do not always agree, they do work jointly for the betterment of this place that we call Paradise – our home, Palm Beach County.

PBC DAYS IN TALLAHASSEE



Palm Beach County Day 2022 was held Jan. 11-12, in Tallahassee. This year's theme was "Back Together, Stronger Together," which signified coming back together after last year's Palm Beach County Day was held virtually due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Holding Palm Beach County Day at the beginning of the legislative session is an excellent opportunity to keep the county's legislative priorities in front of lawmakers all session long.

FIRST-TIME HOME BUYER?



Learn about the steps to homeownership and how to obtain an affordable mortgage in **Palm Beach County** by attending the University of Florida/Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS) Extension First-Time Home Buyer workshop.

The class is provided by the Palm Beach County Cooperative Extension, a local agency approved by Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The course is HUD-approved and is an 8-hour, prepurchase, homebuyer workshop that meets the homebuyer education requirement for workforce

housing and down payment assistance programs. Participants must attend two 4-hour sessions or one 8-hour session for successful completion of the 8-hour program.

Classes are \$10 per individual/couple.

A scholarship is available to those who qualify.

The sessions are offered online via Zoom in English and Spanish.

Documents needed to get your Taxes Filed Free!

- 2019 and 2020 tax return
- Social Security cards and correct birth dates for all family members
- All W-2 wage and tax statements for 2021
- Form 1098 mortgage interest, property taxes
- Form 1099 DIV, G, INT, MISC, Q, R, RRB, SSA for 2021
- A photo ID (you and your spouse, if filing jointly)
- Joint returns require both filers to be present to sign the return
- A voided check and/or savings account number for direct deposit
- Letter 6475, 2021 Economic Impact Payment
- Letter 6419, Total Advance Child Tax Credit Payments

* Even if you meet the income level, complex returns may be considered out of the guidelines for the VITA Program



For Dependent Care Credit you need:

• Name, address, tax ID or social security number of care provider

For Education Credit you need:

- 1098-T or 1098-E
- Amount paid for qualifying education
 expenses

For Premium Tax Credit you need: • 1095-A
